CRCWS Pastoral Search Committee Report

The Search Committee commissioned by our Council has been tasked with presenting the congregation with a nominee to be our next pastor. We have begun meeting to start the arduous task and wanted to give you some idea of the process.

The committee members are John DeYoung and Alan Bilthouse, co-chairmen, Liz Casseday, Jim Buiter, Lynn Veldman, Melissa Gardner and Adrian Breems. We will be assisted in this process by Sam Hamstra, a member of the Rukes Search Group, who the Council has elected to hire. Sam's job is to help us discover who our next pastor will be. He has had many years of experience in this field, first with the company he founded, and now as a member of the Rukes Search Group. He has written books on the subject, and we will be using one of them as a guide in our search. He possesses many resources and has the knowledge and experience that will enable us to do our best to find our next pastor.

First and foremost in the process will be the prayers of the congregation as we start this search process. We covet your prayers and will attempt to communicate with you specific prayer requests along the way.

Most likely, the entire process will take some time, and maybe up to one year before the nominee can be voted upon by the congregation. It is a long time to be without someone to lead us, but the Council has done a great job with giving us interim leadership and we want to make sure the candidate we present is the person God has chosen for us.

Before we begin the actual process of the search, there are some steps that we as a congregation and as a committee need to be taken:

- As stated before, we need to pray for wisdom to discern God's leading in the process;
- We will discover and embrace the identity of our church as a people of God, the bride of Christ and the temple of the Holy Spirit;
- We will be establishing a process for your pervasive prayers;
- We will be listening to you as a congregation and establish a process for clear, concise and compelling communication with you;
- We will be working with the Council as they review and possibly update our website, which is the first place a pastoral candidate will look for information on our church;
- We will be working with Council to develop a church profile to share with potential candidates;
- We will be working with the Council to develop a position description that excites the heart of our next pastor;
- We will devise a guide as to how our meetings are conducted and decisions are made;
- Lastly, we will claim God's promise with additional prayer.

As you can see, this is a formidable task, and we are humbled by the confidence that you have placed in us as a committee to present you with a nominee for our next pastor.

If you have any questions, concerns or comments along the way, please feel free to contact any one of the committee members, and we will attempt to address them with you. As the process goes forward, we will try to always give updates and keep everyone informed, as you are a vital part of this process.

For now though, the most important thing you can do is to pray for us, Sam Hamstra and for our future next pastor.

An Introduction

About me:

I have a deep love and concern for Christ's church, particularly those gatherings of the church that we call the Christian Reformed Church. I grew up in the denomination, baptized and raised at Calvary CRC in Holland, Michigan. When I felt that God was calling me to serve in vocational ministry, I decided to leave the "West Michigan bubble" and studied at Indiana Wesleyan University. I earned my bachelor's and master's degrees at IWU and then completed further graduate studies at Calvin Theological Seminary to meet CRC ordination requirements.

As we speak, I am in the process of defending my Ph.D. dissertation; I plan to graduate this fall from Columbia International University. My doctorate is in systematic theology, focusing my research on evangelical worship practices. I am very passionate about the study and renewal of Christian worship, especially in local church congregations. I participate in worship advising with CRC denominational staff and contribute regularly to the Reformed Worship journal.

I was ordained in the CRC in February 2021, first called to serve Asbury University (Wilmore, Kentucky) as Director of University Chapel. A few months later, I took a risk and accepted a one-year appointment at Trinity Christian College as Interim Campus Pastor. Since August 2022, I have been the permanent chaplain at Trinity, and I also get to teach our ministry courses. I love serving college-aged students at such an important season of their vocational and spiritual formation. God has surprised me with the joys of campus ministry, and I am now grateful that God has surprised me with the opportunity to serve in a part-time capacity at the Western Springs CRC.

Outside of work, you might find me searching out local coffee shops, baking cookies, or spending time with friends. I'm new to the area, so I welcome any recommendations for places to enjoy in the west suburbs!

About my area of ministry at WSCRC:

The council has entrusted me, as Worship Advisor, with responsibilities for preaching and liturgy. I will preach on the first Sunday of the month (and participate in the celebration of Communion), and I will plan the liturgies for each Sunday service. I work closely and collaboratively with Renee DeJager, who plans the musical elements for services. I also serve on the Worship Committee, led by Dr. Sharon Robbert. Finally, I will support the elders with some elements pertaining to the pastoral transition.

My thoughts for ministry at the church in the upcoming year:

I have described myself as a resource to the congregation during this season of transition. With so many staff transitions at this church in the past year, I understand those who might be feeling apprehensive or even pessimistic toward this year of change. I hope, then, to be a stabilizing force and to use what I learn about the congregation to support a healthy and fruitful leadership transition. I also hope that my knowledge of denominational life and pastoral realities might offer an "insider's perspective" to these complex considerations.

This is not my first time serving a vacant Christian Reformed congregation. In 2019, I served the Kibbie CRC (South Haven, Michigan) during a period of vacancy and offered similar support to their ministries of preaching and liturgical planning. Having served as an interim pastor both at Kibbie and at Trinity, I have found that just as much as pastoral transitions can be stressful and panic-inducing, these seasons can also be wonderful opportunities to watch God start new and exciting opportunities. I hope that, in this upcoming year, we might approach this transition with a posture of courage and curiosity, daring to believe that our God will bring us to a good and blessed place.

Based on my observations in these past few months, I believe that God has blessed the Western Springs CRC with the resources, capacity, and enthusiasm for fruitful ministry in our neighborhood. What if we made room for the Spirit to surprise us, disrupting what we think is best and trusting in what God might be calling us to embrace next? I have found the WSCRC family to be a kind, generous, and passionate community, and I pray that God will bring leaders who can align our congregation with God's big dreams.

Renee DeJager, Director of Music Ministries

She is a frequent choral adjudicator and presenter and has held leadership positions in Illinois Music Educators Association and the Illinois chapter and Midwest regional chapter of the American Choral Directors Association. She has been published in the national journal of the American Choral Directors Association.

Outside of teaching, she enjoys traveling, gardening. baking, cooking, reading, and most of all, spending time with her 3 children, all of whom graduated from Timothy Christian High School.
